SPECIAL PUBLIC BUDGET SESSION - 7:00 PM

Chairman Goddard brought the special public budget session to order at 7:00 PM via teleconference.

- 1. Pledge of Allegiance
- 2. Oral Communication

Chairman Goddard welcomed the new Facilities Maintenance Engineering Manager, Carl Wulf, to the Port District.

Port Director Olin provided an update on the current status of Aldo's Restaurant, noting that a construction cost quote is being developed by Bogard Construction.

Commissioner Smith expressed his appreciation for the dredge crew's efforts in significantly deepening the entrance channel over the last several days.

3. Review of Draft FY22 Budget and 5-Year Capital Improvement Plan (FY22 – FY26)

Discussion:

Port Director Olin stated that the FY22 budget was prepared against the backdrop of the Coronavirus pandemic (COVID-19), which has had negative impacts on some FY21 revenue categories. She presented the FY22 Draft Budget and highlighted the following:

- FY21 operating revenue is projected to be underbudget by approximately \$360,000 primarily due to impacts from COVID-19 on:
 - Concession rents
 - Parking
 - RV
- Revenue impacts are partially offset by stronger than expected performance in:
 - Slip rent
 - Launch / Visitor berthing

- Expenditure savings are estimated at \$900,000. As a result, projected Operating Profit (Operating Revenues less Operating Expenses) is expected to exceed the FY21 budget by approximately \$540,000
- Net income loss in FY21 is projected at -\$374,469; however, net of depreciation / capitalized expenses, net income is projected to be positive overall

Port Director Olin stated that the budget approach for FY22 focuses on the following:

- Present a balanced budget that meets debt service requirements while accounting for anticipated decreases in concession revenue due to COVID-19, and eliminating the US Army Corps of Engineers' (USACE) dredging reimbursement from the FY22 budget
- Push budgeted revenues in some categories to expected levels based on current projections and prior years' audit results
- Reduce line item expenditures across budget programs
- Develop spending and operating plan for FY22 that continues a reduced staffing level while restoring some Operations' support services by parttime staff, and fund approved labor contracts
- Fund reserves and Capital Improvement Program at a level less than stated reserve policy goals and objectives to achieve a budgetary surplus, while funding priority Capital Improvement Projects and Capital Outlay

Port Director Olin reviewed the FY22 Salary and Benefit Costs and highlighted the following:

- Salary and Benefit projected increases are primarily due to an adjustment in budgeting for medical expense, increased CalPERS' pension costs, and workers' compensation premium costs. Increased costs are largely offset by staffing reductions due to COVID-19.
- Employer pension expense is approximately \$605,500, which is approximately \$46,000 higher than FY21 rates and represents approximately 15% of anticipated Personnel Services' expenditures.

Port Director Olin reviewed the FY22 Dredge Operations budget. She stated that a \$172,762 contribution will increase available funding in the Dredge Intermediate Fund to \$208,000. She stated that this funding will be utilized for the following expenditures:

- Twin Lakes: Replacement of the Lincoln welder/generator; replacement of the standby marine generator and spare parts
- Dauntless: A-frame repair
- Other dredge systems equipment

Port Director Olin added that the draft FY22 budget initially included a partial setaside for future haul of *Twin Lakes* (\$75,000) and a trailer for the tracked pipe fusion machine (\$8,200). These items were eliminated from the draft budget due to loss of US Army Corps of Engineers' (USACE) work plan funding to create a budget surplus. She stated that staff remains committed to hauling *Twin Lakes*, though the timeline may be pushed out 1-2 years depending on haul options.

Port Director Olin reviewed projected FY21 revenues and expenses for the boatyard, which is in its seventh full year of operation. She stated that the boatyard is projected to be marginally profitable, although some expenditures are captured in other programs. Additionally, she highlighted that revenues do not account for interdepartmental services, which totaled approximately \$35,500 in FY21.

Port Director Olin reviewed projected FY21 revenues and expenses for the fuel service operation. She stated that the fuel sales and fuel expense were lower than anticipated in FY21, though overall the program is projected to be more profitable in FY21 than FY20 due to improved program oversight and management.

Port Director Olin reviewed the Port District's fund balances and current financial position, noting that the amount of unrestricted cash on hand available for operations, emergencies, and improvements is approximately \$6,637,578.

Port Director Olin reviewed recommended FY22 Capital Improvement Projects (CIP) funding:

- Dock Upgrades Project \$35,000
- Pier Rehabilitation Project \$20,000
- Minor Building Restoration Projects \$80,000
- Restroom Building Rehabilitation \$108,600
- Harbor Roads and Parking Lots Pavement Management \$62,000
- Parking Upgrades \$20,000
- East Access Road Embankment Erosion Assessment \$15,000

Port Director Olin stated that the draft FY22 budget proposes new funding in the amount of \$340,600 for the CIP, which is less than the typical \$500,000 funding goal. In addition, the draft budget proposes to reallocate existing CIP project funding as follows:

- Pavement Repairs (F006) Increase funding by \$65,000 from the following sources:
 - Pappy Park (F032) Close out project and allocate remaining funding of \$88
 - Boatyard Marine Ways Inspection / Upgrades (F035) Close out project and allocate remaining funding of approximately \$721

- Dredge Yard Hazmat Shed (F037) Close out project and allocate remaining funding of \$4,735
- Harborwide Sign Study (F038) Close out project and allocate remaining funding of \$4,283
- o Unallocated CIP (F099) Allocate \$55,173 in funding

A discussion ensued regarding appropriate funding levels for the CIP and DIF.

Vice-chairman Geisreiter expressed support for allocating additional funds to both the CIP and DIF and suggested the following:

- Increase CIP funding by \$160,000 from \$340,600 to \$500,000
- Increase DIF funding by \$100,000 from \$172,762 to \$272,762 (allowance for unforeseen equipment repair/maintenance)

Vice-chairman Geisreiter stated that net income proceeds, which are projected to be \$291,316 can be utilized as the funding source. Chairman Goddard agreed with the suggestion and stated that as discussed in prior years, CIP funding should be increased beyond \$500,000 each year to address ongoing infrastructure needs. Commission Reed expressed support for the proposed funding increases.

Commissioner Smith stated that he is not supportive of increasing the CIP and DIF contributions. He stated that in the event additional funds are needed to address priority projects, the Commission can consider a mid-year budget adjustment. Commissioner Gertler agreed.

Port Director Olin confirmed that CIP and DIF funding can be increased without negatively impacting the Port District's debt service ratio.

There was consensus among the Commission to increase CIP funding by \$160,000 and DIF funding by \$100,000 (unallocated). No changes were proposed to the Election Fund or Reserve Fund.

A discussion ensued regarding the proposed FY22 CIP projects.

Commissioner Geisreiter stated that it may be beneficial to allocate a portion of the \$160,000 in increased funding to paving repair. Commissioner Reed agreed and also stated that it is his opinion that the Harborwide Refuse/Recycling Study should remain on the calendar as a future project.

A discussion ensued about the implementation of a slip fee increase. There was consensus among the Commission not to include a slip rent increase in the FY22 budget at this time and continue to monitor quarterly budget reports to determine if a mid-year increase may be warranted to meet required debt service ratios.

Chairman Goddard expressed support for renewing the Port District's annual membership with the California Special Districts' Association in 2022.

There was consensus among the Commission to direct staff to incorporate the following items into the draft FY22 budget for review and action at the regular public session on February 23, 2021:

- No marina fee increase.
- 2% CPI increase for landside leases in accordance with existing lease agreements.
- Increase capital improvement program contribution from \$340,600 to \$500,000, funding priority projects including paving repairs and building / restroom rehabilitation.
- Increase the Dredge Intermediate Fund contribution from \$172,762 to \$272,762, to fund an allowance to facilitate unanticipated critical dredge system equipment repair and replacement.

10. Approval of FY22 Budget and Capital Improvement Program

Discussion: Port Director Olin stated that the Port Commission reviewed the draft FY22 budget and proposed list of Capital Improvement Projects (CIP) at its Special Public Session of February 9, 2021.

Port Director Olin reviewed the draft FY22 budget and highlighted the following:

- No marina fee increase.
- 2% CPI increase for landside leases in accordance with existing lease agreements.
- Capital Improvement Plan: \$500,000 contribution funding priority projects including paving repairs, building restoration, restroom rehabilitation, and dock upgrades.

- Dredge Intermediate Fund: \$272,762 contribution, adding a new unspecified allowance of \$100,000 to facilitate unanticipated critical dredge system equipment repair and replacement.
- Full funding for Reserve and Election funds.
- Funds approved labor contracts.
- Restores some part-time/hourly staffing positions for operational support.
- Restores funding for seasonal operation of the water taxi.
- Aligns with identified Port District priorities adopted in January 2021.

A brief discussion ensued regarding the feasibility of mailing out an informational letter with FY22 budget highlights to all marina customers in an effort to increase communication. Port Director Olin confirmed that staff can prepare a letter for mailing.

In response to a question posed by Chairman Goddard, Port Director Olin stated that the FY22 Salary and Benefit projected increases are primarily due to an adjustment in budgeting for medical expense, increased CalPERS' pension costs, and workers' compensation premium costs. These increased costs are largely offset by staffing reductions due to COVID-19 and are not anticipated to increase significantly in FY23.

Robert Dewitt from the Santa Cruz Yacht Club expressed support for the decision not to increase marina fees and thanked staff for the budget presentation.

The Commission thanked staff for the budget presentation.

12. Port Director's Report

Murray Street Bridge

Port Director Olin stated that in an effort to move forward with the bridge project and preserve \$1.9 million in allocated project funding, the City of Santa Cruz is expecting to commence the Murray Street Bridge Seismic Retrofit Project in the Spring of 2022. This optimistic deadline is driving a number of required administrative tasks, including updating the appraisals, and entering into contracts.

USACE Reimbursement Review Request - Dredging

Port Director Olin stated that staff is currently working to prepare audited 5-year dredging expense totals for submittal to the Corps. Once reviewed and approved by the Corps, the District's annual dredging reimbursement level will increase from \$385,000 to \$525,000. If the USACE reviews and approves the request promptly, the Port District could receive some additional unbudgeted revenue for 2020 dredging operations.

Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary "MBNMS" Advisory Council Meeting
Port Director Olin provided a summary of the MBNMS Advisory Council meeting she
participated in, which was conducted virtually on February 19, 2021. She stated that the
advisory council has prioritized a list of 43 topics to be discussed over the year including
marine mammal interactions, sea level rise, and sediment management.

A brief discussion ensued regarding the importance of the Port District's attendance at the MBNMS Advisory Council meetings to participate in topic discussions that may impact harbor operations.

13. Harbormaster's Report

Harbormaster Anderson stated that there is an open recruitment for seasonal, part-time operations staff.

Harbormaster Anderson stated that on March 3, 2021, six derelict boats will be demolished and removed from the harbor through the Surrendered and Abandoned Vessel Exchange (SAVE) grant program.

Chairman Goddard thanked staff for maintaining the harbor's walking tour stations.

14. Facilities Maintenance & Engineering Report

Facilities Maintenance and Engineering Manager (FME) Wulf stated that dredging operations continue to restore depths in the entrance channel and the X/J fairway in the north harbor.

FME Wulf stated that maintenance crews continue work on the northern wall repairs at 333 Lake Avenue. Crews have completed the installation of the remaining two windows and all interior work. Work to replace the exterior siding is next.

SUBJECT: Review Site Plan Concepts for Port District Owned Property at 1025 7th Avenue

Recommendation: Review site assessment concepts and provide input / direction to staff.

BACKGROUND

The Port District owns 2.2 acres on the northwest corner of 7th and Brommer (APN 026-211-69), at 1025 7th Avenue which is zoned C-2 "Community Commercial." Additionally, the Port District has an Encroachment Permit 15-083 over a portion of the County's right-of-way on the southeast corner of the site for parking and related uses.

The property has been used for dry storage of boats and trailers predating Port District ownership of the property. There was formerly a single-family home on the property, which was demolished in 2000, to accommodate additional vessel dry storage and storage of commercial fishery-related equipment.

Other uses of the property include storage of Port District containers which house infrequently used items like fish kill clean-up supplies; a covered area with secondary containment for oil filter and recycled lubricants pick-up; a dredge boneyard for off-season storage of equipment and other seldom or never-used items such as inoperable equipment, parts, pipe and metal; ad hoc storage and impound of vessels and other items that have found their way to various reaches of the property. While many of the stored items are oversized and/or used only during the dredge season, much of what is stored on the property should be evaluated for future utility and if not needed, sold at surplus, recycled or discarded.

Dry storage licenses require regular vessel use by boat owners and staff has endeavored at various times in the past to inventory the 7th Avenue Dry Storage yard and ensure vessels are used, currently registered, and operable. Storage of vehicles and equipment unrelated to boating or commercial fishing is discouraged and most of the dead vehicle and shed storage has been eliminated over time. However, the yard continues to house a number of vessels that are clearly inoperable, and it is a constant effort to keep unnecessary materials (aka, junk) from accumulating.

Vice-chairman Reed Geisreiter and Commissioner Steve Reed serve on an ad hoc committee focused on evaluating opportunities for redevelopment of the 7th and Brommer area. Mesiti-Miller Engineering was retained to conduct a site assessment and study options that meet uses anticipated in the Harbor Development Plan and align with the Port District's adopted goals and mission statement.¹ The goal of the site assessment was to study options for expanding and

¹ The primary mission of the Santa Cruz Port Commission is to ensure that Santa Cruz Harbor is a viable operational and financial entity, providing a full array of boating and marine related opportunities for the public.

improving vessel dry storage, adding commercial space to house a small restaurant and retail outlet to serve the Live Oak / Santa Cruz community, boaters and visitors, creating an inviting entry to the north harbor and Arana Gulch Trail and providing for overflow trailer rig parking. In addition to creating new jobs, the combined site plan elements will generate much needed additional revenue for the Port District which is supported primarily by user fees.

ANALYSIS

Site Assessment Concepts

Rodney Cahill of Mesiti-Miller Engineering ("MME") developed four site plan concepts for the Port District's property at 7th and Brommer; two options for reconfiguring the North Harbor Dry Storage Facility to accommodate a relocated dredge boneyard (currently sited at 7th and Brommer); and a boundary and topographic survey. All design concepts site a small restaurant and retail outlet on 7th Avenue and include vehicle parking, a bike corral and overflow parking for trailer rigs. A permeable paving system for the dry storage area such as Truegrid or similar product is being considered (see Attachment B).

The following is a brief recap of the concepts for 7th Avenue Dry Storage ("7BDS") and North Harbor Dry Storage ("NHDS"):

Concept C2.0 has a mix of space lengths with widths ranging from 9.5' to 10.5'. All spaces in Concept C4.0 feature 10.5' space widths (for reference, launch ramp parking spaces are 10.5' wide). Concept C2.0 accommodates more vessels in a variety of space lengths and generates more revenue than Concept C4.0, and the mix of space widths is workable. Both options provide 13 vessel rig overflow spaces. Currently, fees for the 7BDS yard are based on a flat rate per space, while the paved NHDS yard bases its fees on space size. Estimated additional revenue is based on a space size fee schedule (see Attachment C, "Dry Storage Revenue Estimate").

All 7BDS concepts relocate the dredge boneyard to the NHDS facility adjacent to the working dredge yard; however, NHDS Concept C6.0 manages to improve space organization while retaining 106 dry storage spaces of varying lengths and widths and still accommodate relocation of the boneyard.

Next Steps

Staff is seeking input on the various options presented for 7BDS and NHDS. Rodney Cahill of MME will participate in the March 23 Port Commission meeting and will be available to answer any questions about the various design concepts.

If preferred options are identified, staff will solicit a proposal from MME for preliminary engineering and design development, including a construction cost estimate, recommended construction phasing, and identifying permitting needs.

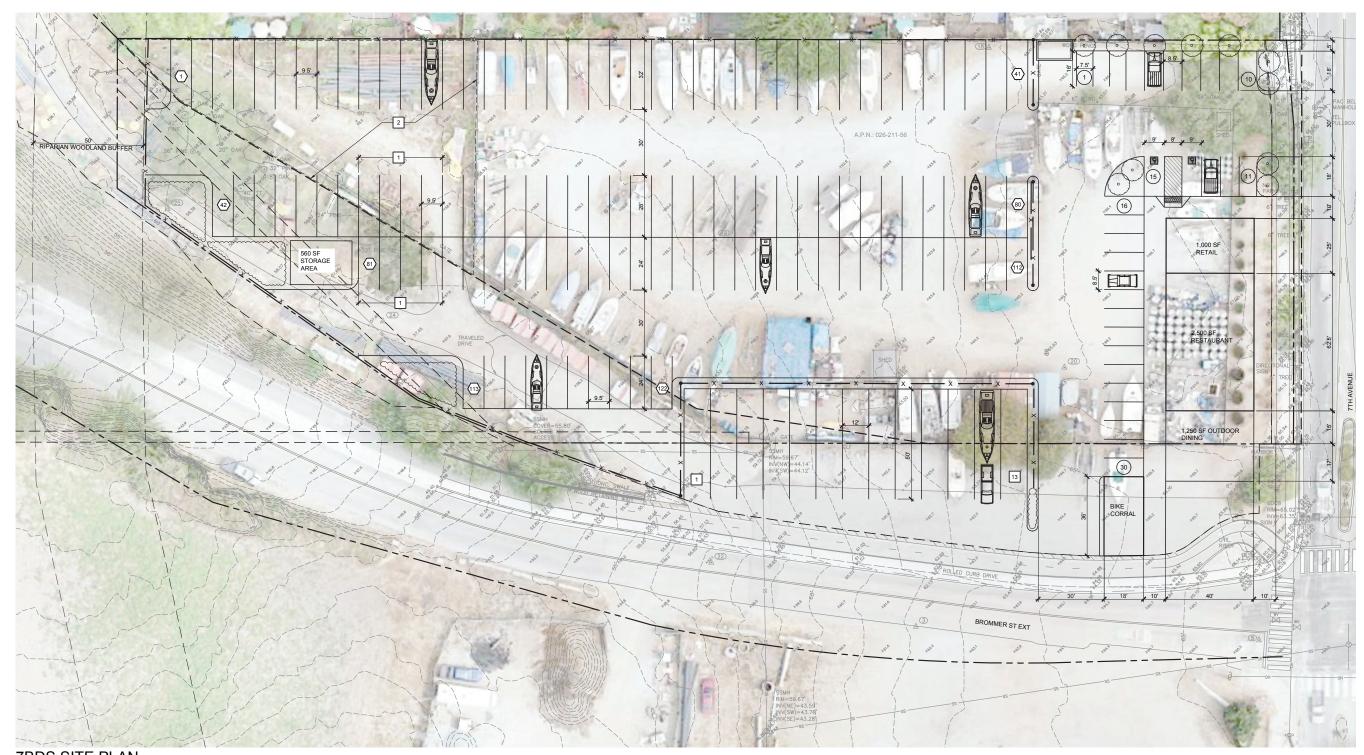
IMPACT ON PORT DISTRICT RESOURCES

The financial impact on Port District resources is not identified at this time, but it is anticipated that if the Port Commission directs staff to proceed with obtaining a proposal from Mesiti-Miller Engineering for preliminary engineering and design of a preferred site plan option, future Capital Improvement Plan funding will be required for development of construction documents and specifications, permitting and construction.

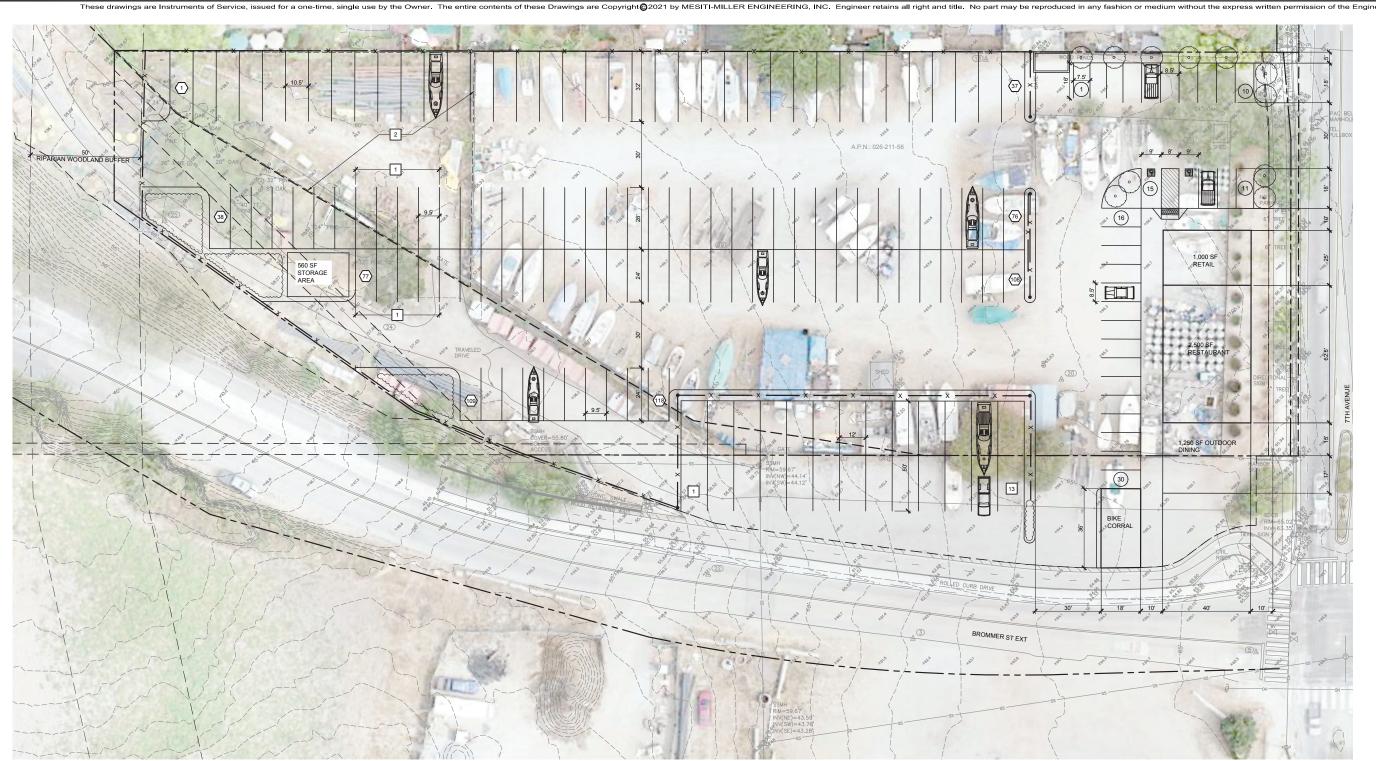

BACKGROUND

The Port District's checking account is maintained at Comerica Bank. The current authorized check signers include two Commissioners (Commissioner Goddard and Commissioner Reed), Port Director Olin, and the three managers. The Commission previously approved authorization limits whereby one authorized person may sign checks up to \$5,000, two authorized persons must sign checks between \$5,000 and \$50,000, and two authorized persons (with at least one being a Commissioner) sign checks in excess of \$50,000.

ANALYSIS

Comerica Bank requires a declaration designating authority for authorized signers (Attachment A). The declaration removes former Facilities Maintenance and Engineering Manager, Matt Kerkes, and adds current Facilities Maintenance and Engineering Manager Carl Wulf to the list of authorized signers. Commissioners Goddard and Reed, Port Director Olin, Administrative Services Manager Mac Laurie, and Harbormaster Anderson remain authorized signers.

IMPACT ON PORT DISTRICT RESOURCES

There is no cost to the Port District associated with designating check signers.

SUBJECT: Authorization to Encumber Capital Improvement Plan ("CIP") Funding for Replacement

of the Facilities Work Boat Odd Job (\$25,000)

Recommendation: Authorize creation of a new Capital Improvement Plan ("CIP") Plan

Project for Replacement of the Workboat "Odd Job":

a) Transfer \$15,000 in Capital Outlay Funding from the FY21 Operating Budget to the new CIP project fund;

b) Transfer \$10,000 from unreserved cash to the new CIP project fund.

BACKGROUND

The Facilities Department's workboat *Odd Job* is a 1964 Boston Whaler acquired by the Port District in 2006. Capital outlay funding to replace *Odd Job* has been included in the past two budget cycles but not expended -- \$10,000 in FY20 and \$15,000 in FY21.

Facilities staff had hoped to fabricate a metal vessel similar to the dredge skiff; however, the rising cost of metal, as well as design and fabrication challenges the crew would face in constructing a vessel from scratch have caused this project to be shelved. The need for a replacement is pressing, and in considering options, staff now recommends purchasing a sturdy, pre-manufactured workboat or other used vessel.

ANALYSIS

Staff has researched various replacement options, ranging from a used Boston Whaler-type vessel to a pre-manufactured workboat. The recent increased interest in boating has made finding a suitable used vessel more challenging, though staff continues to research and follow-up on possible options.

Staff has solicited proposals from two well-known manufacturers of workboats:

- J&J Boatworks, Inc. quoted a new J-Skiff vessel for a base price of \$17,800, with delivery in 90 days. Tax (\$1,646.50) and shipping (\$4,300.00) bring the total cost to \$23,746.50.
- American Workboat also provided a quote. Their workboat is slightly longer than the J&J vessel and has a higher base price of \$24,550, not including tax and shipping.

Whether purchasing a used Boston Whaler-type vessel or a new (workboat from a manufacturer such as J&J Boatworks), staff believes that \$25,000 will provide adequate funding for acquisition. The existing 50 hp engine on *Odd Job* will be repurposed on any replacement vessel.

It is recommended that the \$15,000 in capital outlay funding included in the FY21 operating budget for replacement of *Odd Job* be transferred to a new CIP project account for replacement of the workboat, plus an additional \$10,000 in funding from unreserved cash to ensure there is adequate funding for the vessel, tax, delivery and a small contingency. Encumbering the capital outlay funding included in the operating budget will ensure the funding remains available for acquisition of a vessel in FY22.

IMPACT ON PORT DISTRICT RESOURCES

\$15,000 of capital outlay funding is currently available for this project in the FY21 operating budget. Increased funding in the amount of \$10,000 is proposed to be encumbered out of unreserved cash, which as of February 1, 2021, was approximately \$6.6 million.

The \$25,000 estimated acquisition cost provides for a small contingency and is within the Port Director's purchasing limit authority.

Santa Cruz Port District 2021 California Marine Affairs and Navigation Conference (CMANC) Washington, DC Virtual Meetings February 25-26, 2021

Conference Debrief by Port Director Olin

Vice-chair Goddard and I participated in meetings with legislators and legislative staff members, as well as various subcommittee and agency representatives during CMANC's two-day "virtual" Washington, DC conference on February 25 and 26. Our typical Washington, DC schedule involves walking or hailing a cab to various meeting locations in and around the Capitol. In contrast, this year's meetings were a whirlwind of video conferencing around my kitchen table, but equally important to reminding agency staff and legislators about the mutually beneficial, successful partnership between the US Army Corps of Engineers ("USACE") and the Port District to perform annual maintenance dredging of the federal entrance channel at Santa Cruz Harbor. The agenda is attached.

Attendees were divided into teams ("Team Dredge" and "Team California") and participants outlined specific funding requests for FY22 (the Port District's updated handout is attached), and advocated for issues important to CMANC. California's ports and harbors were presented as an integrated system that is vital to the nation's economy. Representatives of ports and harbors large and small advocated for fully funding the US Army Corps of Engineers, and attendees expressed their appreciation for the Corps' support of navigation projects.

Meeting Highlights:

- Earmarks: There was much discussion about the potential return to earmarks, and what form that may take. (Note: Subsequent to the CMANC meetings, Congressional democrats are supporting a return to earmarks which will impact this year's process for the Energy and Water Appropriations bill. Projects that are not included in the President's budget will be considered earmarks and House members are limited to just 10 earmark requests across all 12 appropriations bills. It is unclear at this time if the House will maintain work plan funding "pots" and it's also unclear whether the Senate will adopt earmarks.)
- US Army Corps of Engineers Headquarters: Corps leadership and staff discussed their approach to meeting their mission of being "safe, reliable, efficient and effective" through new approaches including multi-year dredging demonstration projects, finding ways to efficiently combine work, exploring

technological advances and trying to achieve a better understanding about where to dredge and when by working with individual Districts. This has been challenging for the Corps in the face of leadership and staff turnover with the change of Administration, and the timing and process for project appropriations being in flux. There was an in depth discussion of the Corps' budgeting process, and since this topic is of particular interest to us this year, I'll give a little detail.

The budget process starts at the District level and advances up to Division, then Headquarters, where the Army Chief's technical recommendation is developed and provided to the Secretary of the Army. The Secretary develops the Army's recommendation which is then forwarded to the Office of Management and Budget ("OMB"). That final budget step results in a negotiation between the Secretary and OMB, in which OMB provides top-line numbers and the Secretary reworks the budget to fit. It was estimated that 70% of what's submitted is retained in the final document, while 30% of the work plan may not get funded. When the negotiation between the Secretary and OMB is complete, the Army Chief provides a recommendation on how the work plan funding will be divided amongst projects within 60 days. The Chief's recommendation is typically final, though other projects can be added from "... the top down." My favorite closing statement for this topic was "OMB says they gave the Corps all of the money they asked for, but the Corps is told by OMB how much to ask for."

- White House Council on Environmental Quality ("CEQ"): The 30% by 2030 goal was discussed. CEQ is issuing a report within 90 days which will address basic questions to help layout a framework for soliciting stakeholder input and developing policy over the next 4 years that balances use and conservation:
 - o what is the meaning of conservation?
 - o what counts toward meeting the 30% goal?
 - o identifying processes that work well for building consensus
 - identifying solutions versus defining "wants"
 - o how to increase equitable participation

I participated in the "Team Dredge" meetings. Chairman Goddard participated in the "Team California" meetings and may have further information / insights to share.

History

From 1964 to 1986, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers ("USACE") performed annual maintenance dredging of the Santa Cruz Harbor federal navigation channel.

In 1986, under agreement with USACE, Santa Cruz Port District ("SCPD") assumed responsibility for annual maintenance dredging of the federal channel, in exchange for the federal government paying for a percentage of the costs.

Following expiration of the 1986 Agreement, SCPD and USACE entered into a new Agreement in November 2015. USACE's annual reimbursement to SCPD was set at 35% of average annual expenditure, totaling \$385,000 per year for calendar years 2015-19, and adjusted based on average annual expenditures for the final five years of the Agreement (2020-24).

Equitable, successful partnership between the federal government and local sponsor promoting public safety, environmental stewardship, economic stability, and local jobs.

Santa Cruz Harbor is the only small craft harbor that has agreed to assume responsibility for and share in the cost of dredging a federal navigation channel. SCPD operates as a government-owned business, funded almost entirely by user fees, so USACE reimbursement provides critical financial support.

The Agreement sets the reimbursement rate at 35% of actual average annual expenses and adjusts the amount for the 5-year period for 2020-24, based on actual expenditures for the previous 5-year period.

Accordingly, the annual federal reimbursement increased from \$385,000 to \$525,000 per year in 2020.

Santa Cruz Harbor's dredging operation serves the interests of future generations and meets Congressional criteria for work plan funding.

- Demonstrated ability to secure permits and complete work each calendar year.
- As the local sponsor, SCPD pays 65% of the cost of dredging the federal navigation channel, and in 2016 invested its own funds in a \$5 million dredge, Twin Lakes.
- ◆ Directly supports jobs and relieves the Corps from having to secure contract crews to dredge the channel, reducing critical maintenance backlogs. Locally, dredging O&M creates 6 full-time and 6 seasonal / part-time positions, and supports 53+ full-time and part-time/seasonal positions. Nationally, Santa Cruz Harbor's dredging program supports industry manufacturing and consulting jobs.
- Santa Cruz Harbor supports a presence by the US Coast Guard (USCG).
- The Santa Cruz Harbor Patrol provides first responder search and rescue when USCG Station Santa Cruz is unmanned. The Port District's marine rescue unit responded to 414 marine search and rescue requests from 2015 to present, and saved 276 lives, functions that cannot be performed without a safe and navigable channel.
- SCPD maintenance dredging addresses critical shoaling of the federal channel which would otherwise close the facility.

Salmon Season 2021

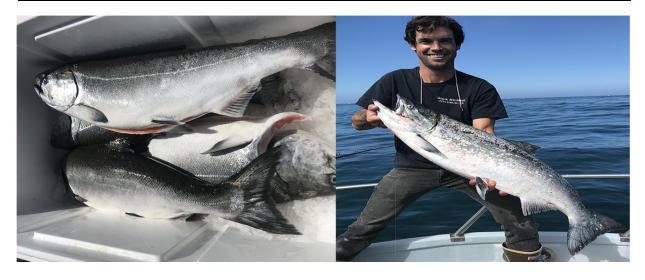
Staff remotely attended a Salmon Information Meeting on February 25th. The annual meeting is hosted by the CA Department of Fish and Wildlife and is generally the first overview and analysis of the predicted salmon abundance for the year. With diminished returns and a lower stock abundance forecast for some runs, it was expected that the 2021 season opener may be delayed in the Monterey management zone (Pigeon Point to U.S./Mexico Border).

On March 10, 2021, the season alternatives were released. Surprisingly, the Monterey management zone (recreational) was not constrained and will enjoy a full salmon season starting April 3, 2021. Commercial salmon anglers will start May 1, 2021, but will see less time on the water than last year.

Noteworthy is the fact that the San Francisco management zone (Pigeon Point to Point Arena) will not begin its recreational salmon season until June 24, 2021, at the earliest, making the Monterey Bay area the focus of the recreational salmon fleet for the first 11 weeks of the season.

The final season will be set at the Pacific Fishery Management Council meeting April 6-15. The alternatives are as follows:

Vessel Disposal

Harbor Patrol staff coordinated the disposal of six abandoned/derelict vessels on March 3, 2021. The vessels were removed from the water, dismantled, and transported to the landfill by a contractor at a cost of \$7,185.00. Expenses are reimbursable to the District under the CA Division of Boating Waterways SAVE Grant Program.

Marine Travelift Training

Staff from the Operations, Maintenance, and Dredge departments participated in a certification training provided by Marine Travelift Inc. on February 19, 2021, at the boatyard. The training covered safety guidelines, crane maintenance, and operation. The hands-on training was intended to give District staff across all departments the knowledge and ability to safely operate the lift on an emergency basis and maintain the equipment to the highest standard. Fortunately, there is an opportunity to practice lift operation when removing derelict/abandoned boats from the water, which was the case when removing vessels for this month's disposal.





Seasonal/Part-Time Staffing

The Operations Department added three new part-time staff members to assist with parking, launch ramp, and general customer service. Fishing and beach season is upon us and with restrictions easing on restaurants, staff expects heavy visitation and water use throughout the spring and into summer. More part-time/seasonal staff may be added depending on operational need. The water taxi will resume service sometime this year, with operational plans adjusted based on COVID-19 guidance and measures.

County Environmental Health Inspection

On February 22, 2021, the Port District underwent a hazardous materials inspection with the County's Division of Environmental Health. Inspections are performed to ensure compliance with permits and other regulations of the California Environmental Reporting System. During the inspection, only three minor items were noted for correction, all of which have subsequently been remedied.

The fisheries report consists of data from two sources: the Department of Fish and Wildlife (DFW) and the H&H Fresh Fish (resident fish buyer). The data from DFW is partially redacted in accordance with federal fisheries laws. Data is considered confidential when less than three separate vessels land species at any one port. For species landed by three or more separate vessels, the full data is made public and includes weight. For other data, the species landed is shown with no weight data.

Dredging Operations:

Twin Lakes

Valley Power finally completed warranty repairs on the standby generator. The dredge crew installed the generator back on *Twin Lakes* and returned the rental generator. After one day in service, the alternator failed and the crew had to replace that component. Dredging operations have been going well. The crew has been able to reach out past the jetty for a few days and clear quite a wide path. With rough seas approaching, the crew removed all of the extension piping and moved inside the channel to clear the west and east sides of the harbor entrance.

Squirt

The dredge crew added pipeline for *Squirt* to restore depths in the northernmost portion of the X/J fairway. The dredge crew has been working with Harbor Patrol to return some of the displaced vessels into their permanent berthing locations in the north harbor.

Maintenance:

333 Lake Avenue - Northern Wall Repairs

Maintenance crews completed the replacing windows and siding on the north side of the building. The building is now waterproofed and painted.

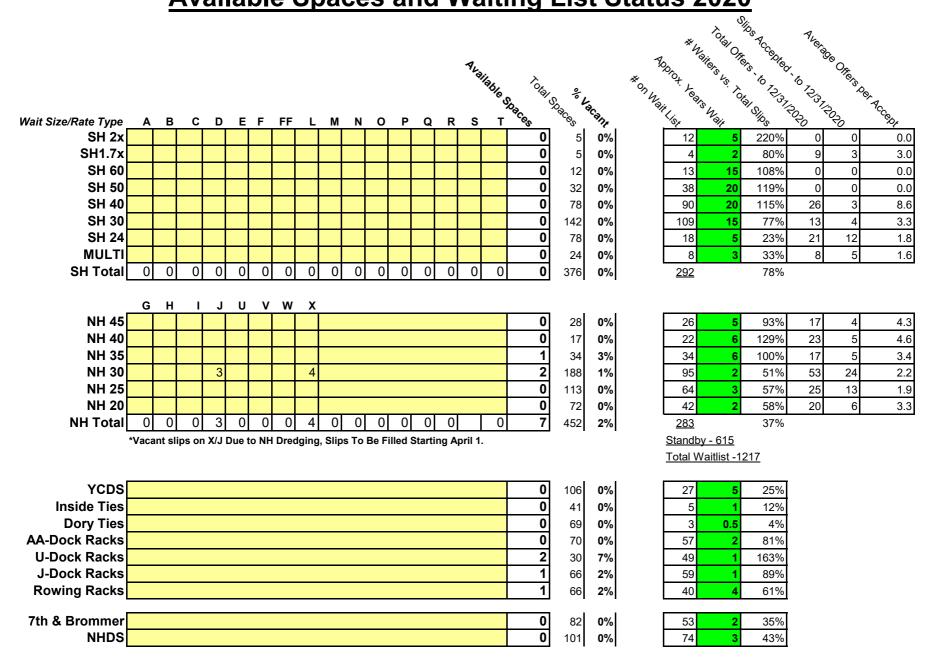

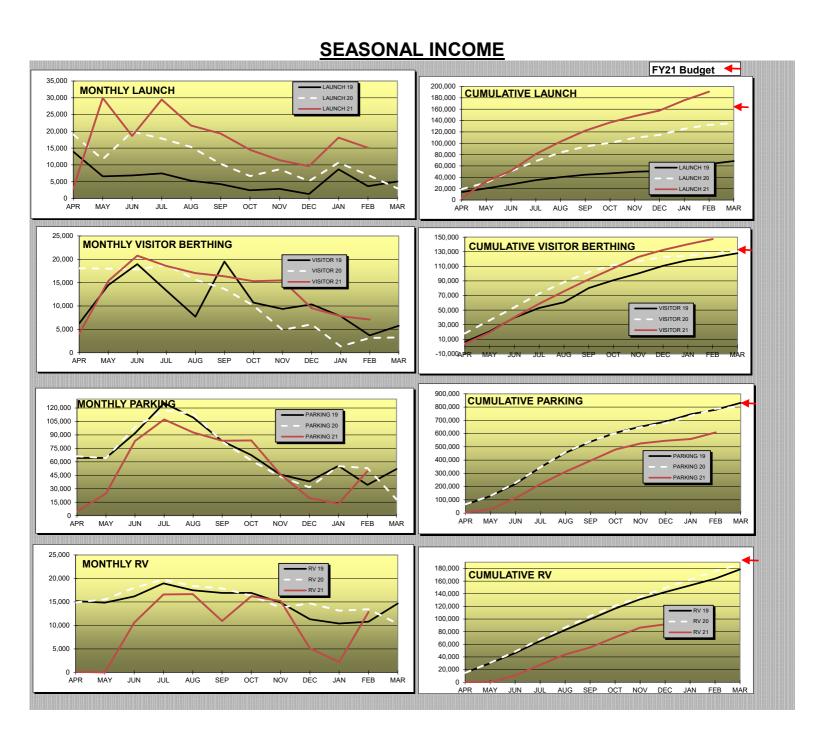
The gangway project is scheduled to commence by March 24, 2021. The crew plans to start at S-dock and then wil work south toward N-dock. S-dock is one of the easier starting points and we will be able to figure out a good process going forward.

Facilities Engineering Manager:

It has been almost two months on duty at the harbor and I have enjoyed every minute. The harbor is a quite dynamic place with something new and different every day. I have completed training to become a certified Travelift operator and participated in the extraction of a few surrendered vessels that were scheduled for disposal through the SAVE program. Training with the boatyard crew has been very interesting. I continue to learn and expand my knowledge of the harbor. I am working with Haro & Kasunich on what options we have for repairing the sea wall by the booster pump. The Santa Cruz City Water Department notified me of a water leak at one of the harbor's meters, and I am working with staff to try and determine the cause. We have turned off the water to the dry storage yard for now until we can determine the exact location of the leak.

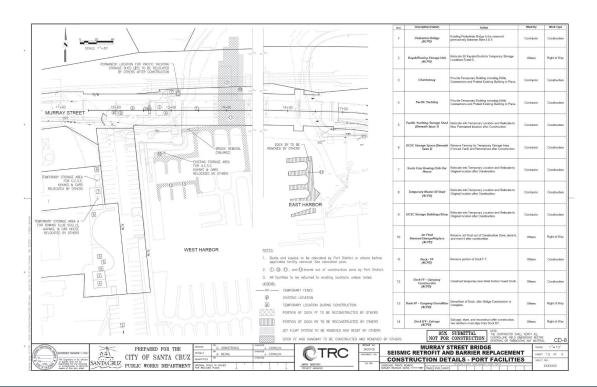
RELOCATION PLAN



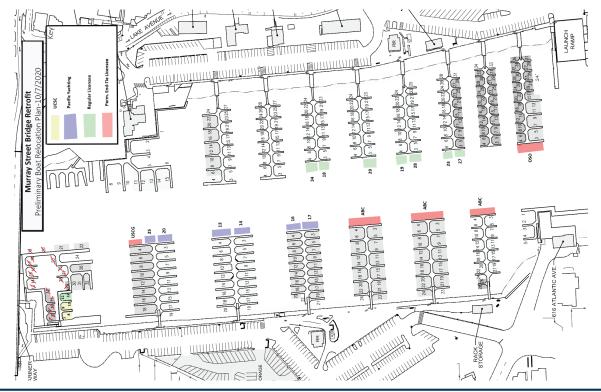


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RELOCATION PLAN (CON)

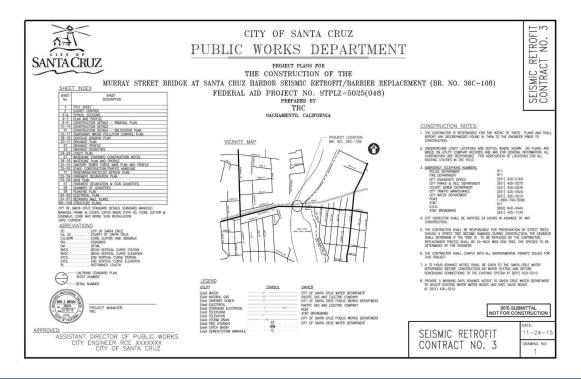

Phase 1: Construction in East Zone

2 months (May-July)[1]

- * Temporarily relocate overhead utilities north of bridge
- Prepare construction staging area (8,000 sq.ft.) at harbor boat yard
 Retrofit Bent 9 & Abutment 10; install anchor piles
- * Erect Girder Span 9
- * Remove existing south rail

- * Install traffic control system with alternating 1-way traffic
- * Close Murray for 7 days for driving anchor piles
- * Temporary relocation (dry storage) of 9 dry-docked boats from boat yard
- * Traffic controls along Lake Avenue during construction staging area setup Close east walkway under bridge

Phase 2: Construction in Eastern Waterway

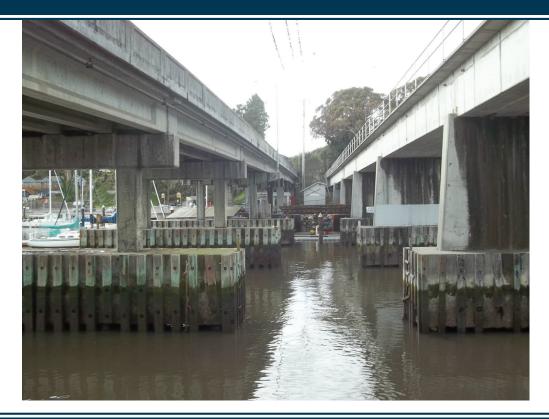
